






Michigan Supreme Court Selection

Which of the following do you think should have the greatest input on who is selected to serve as a Justice on the Michigan Supreme Court?




Role of Personal Viewpoints

I am going to read you the opinions of two people. Please tell me which one comes closest to your view.


PERSON 1: Judges should interpret and apply the law as it is written and <u>not</u> take into account their own viewpoints and experiences.

PERSON 2: Judges should go beyond interpreting and applying the law and take into account their own viewpoints and experiences.




Role of Personal Viewpoints

In general, which type of judge do you prefer?






More often than not should the Michigan Supreme Court rely on precedent or overturn precedent?


And, how much should Justices on the Michigan Supreme Court rely on their personal viewpoints and experiences when deciding to overturn precedent?


PERSON 1: believes that when the Supreme Court evaluates cases, relying on precedent is very important because doing so establishes efficiency and consistency for the courts.

PERSON 2: believes that when the Supreme Court evaluates cases, relying on precedent is not that important because doing so relies too much on the opinions of one court.




Ease of Bringing Lawsuits






